FROM FATHER MARK



One of the things that I have learned about my character is that I am not a big proponent for change. I like routine, I like ritual and I need to have a consistency of people in my life. However, this does not mean that I won't change – but it needs to be deliberate, it needs to be methodical and the change needs to make sense for me.

"The Roman Missal is the book containing all the prayers used during the celebration of Mass. From the late fourth century until 1970 Catholics throughout the world celebrated Mass in Latin. Since 1570, the universal Church celebrated Mass using the Missal published by Pope Pius V following the Council of Trent, albeit with minor additions. Following the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965), Pope Paul VI issued a new Missal in Latin and gave permission for the prayers of the Mass to be translated into the various languages of the people who would gather to celebrate Mass. The Missal that we currently use was produced in 1970 and slightly updated in 1975. It was the first edition of the Missal to be published and approved by the Holy Father for use in English. In 2002, Pope John Paul II issued a new Latin edition of the Roman Missal which included additional prayers for the celebration of Mass in honour of newly-canonized saints and for certain feasts and other occasions." (*Fr. M. Kroech – Diocese of Hamilton*) Since then the revised Missal, the Third edition, has been a work in progress. It is this Third Edition that we will begin to use in November.

We continue on the path of the uninterrupted tradition, "which Christ the Lord instituted at the Last Supper and commanded his apostles to do in his memory." (*GIRM 3*) Over the past six weeks the Parish community has learned the revision. This has been a process in which we have been open to the work of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit gives us hearts that are ready to receive this great gift, and we know that as we say new words, we celebrate the unchanging belief in the Sacrifice and celebration that is Eucharist.

With words raised high, with postures that place us rightly in God's presence and with the chants that put us in the presence of the angels, we are reminded that our prayer, our faith and our life in Christ opens new doors, situations and relationships. We know then that we recognize the new place that God has led us and we experience his greatness, his compassion and his love anew.

Please know that this is an exciting time in the life of the Church, and the parishioners, students, parents, staff and clergy of St. John Brebeuf Community are grateful that we continue to be part of the act of thanksgiving. **Change is good!**

1. Crying is the way babies tell you they need something.

5. When babies are too cold or too hot, they might cry.

9. You must NEVER shake a baby.

12. Everyone has different perspectives about events and feelings.
13. Our temperament will show how we act when we are scared, mad or sad.
14. Just as parents help babies, we can help each other work through problems.

Discuss cyberbullying with your child to promote online safety

Millions of kids in all age groups are online and on cell phones every day--at home, at school, at friends' homes and at the library. And unfortunately, studies show that 42% of kids have been bullied while online. How can you protect your child from this new kind of bullying behavior? Here are some tips:

- Talk about cyberbullying. Let your child know that no one should put up with bullying.
- Keep the computer in a place where you can monitor your child's online activity.
- Remind your child to keep his passwords private and to change them often.
- Tell your child never to share personal information online, such as his phone number, address or age.
- Have your child use the privacy tools available on social networking sites to make his profile or photos visible only to friends.
- Tell your child never to respond to cyberbullying--even to a text message. Responding only encourages the bully.
- Document cyberbullying. Save screen shots of comments made to or about your child. Share them with the school and with law enforcement.

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Researchers highlight some of the benefits of homework

It's natural for families to ask themselves, "Is the time we spend on homework worthwhile?" Researchers have wondered the same thing! There's no simple answer, but studies show homework does have benefits, including:

- Parent involvement. Reviewing homework with your child raises the chance it will get turned in. It also informs you about your child's classes, teachers and abilities.
- Reliability. When young kids do homework, they develop responsibility, persistence and time management skills. They need these traits as they progress through school.

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Turn your child's mistakes into learning opportunities

Mistakes, it is said, are the stepping stones to success. Now research on how the brain learns shows making mistakes is often one of the best ways to learn.

Scientists at the University of Exeter monitored the brains of people who were making predictions based on information they were given. Then they received new information and had to change their predictions.

The study found that people tended to remember this new information the next time they saw it. The brain sent an "early warning" that helped them remember what they had learned.

What does this mean for parents? Sometimes, it's probably best to let your child make some mistakes. Don't keep nagging her to finish the project that's due on Friday. Instead, let her find out for herself what happens when she waits until the very last minute.

Then talk about it together. Help your child identify for herself the mistakes she made. Work with her to see how she might have made different choices.

Say, "So maybe leaving things until the last minute isn't the best way for you to work. Next time, it might be better to do things a little bit at a time so they get done on time."

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Four strategies help your child take responsibility for learning

While your child is a student, learning is his job. To do it well, he has to be an active learner--one who takes action instead of just listening. For example, he needs to:

1. Arrive prepared. It's not enough just to show up for school. It's also important to get a good night's sleep, eat a nutritious breakfast and bring necessities.
2. Participate in discussions. Your child should ask questions, make comments and exchange ideas with others. It's especially useful to speak up if something is confusing to him.
3. Stay organized. Help your child create a system for organizing papers, assignments and other materials. Also have him collect a few friends' phone numbers. If he's missing an assignment, he can call someone for it. Be persistent. School can be tough, and doing well takes work. Support your child as he tackles assignments and reviews for tests. Show confidence that his efforts will pay off!

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Encourage your child to take action and promote kindness

Children aren't always kind to each other. They pick on other kids. They say mean things behind other people's backs.

But your child doesn't have to accept that unkindness as the norm. Instead, you can teach your child a simple rule: Do something about it.

If your child witnesses a classmate being treated unkindly or left out, help him think through actions he could take.

Your child might:

- Start a conversation with a classmate about a book he has read or a school assignment.
- Ask a left-out classmate to sit with him at lunch.
- Compliment a classmate on something. "Your handwriting is neat," or "I like that shirt."

Just simply smile at a classmate.

The next day, have your child report on what he did--and how it made him feel.

As your child takes these actions, he learns many important lessons. He will learn how it feels to do something positive to help another person. Even more important, he will learn that when he sees something wrong, he doesn't have to accept it. Instead, he has the power to make a difference. He can do something about it.

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Promote effective study habits for a successful school year

Homework can be a major source of conflict for parents and kids. But even if study time goes well in your family, it's important to make sure you're covering the basics. Take small, simple steps that promote cooperation and good study habits. Remember to:

- Choose a regular time and place for studying. It should be somewhere quiet with no TV or similar distractions. Pick a comfortable spot and stock it with necessities. Kids study better, and with fewer complaints, when they follow a routine.
- Allow free time first. Some kids need to blow off steam after school by exercising or chatting. Many also head straight for a snack or drink. Keep healthy options available that will energize your child for work and play.
- Encourage organization. Productive studying starts with a to-do list. Older elementary school students should make one each day.
- Postpone screen time. Watching TV and playing video games are privileges that often take away from priorities, including homework, reading and socializing. Save all screen time for after homework and studying. Pay attention. Homework time is a chance for you to learn about your child. Does she excel at reading?

We have also been careful with how we use our school supplies. If we use things sparingly then we will be able to save money for other school expenses. Sometimes, other people eat at our desks and then we are responsible for cleaning it up. This is not fair but we are tolerant and enjoy working on a clean and germ-free desk. Here are some things we can do to be more tolerant:

- ensure no one is teased, left out, sad or lonely
- try to change ourselves for the better instead of trying to change others
- accepting other people's choices without becoming angry or upset
- accepting people the way they are, faults and all
- making others feel at home
- showing respect or appreciation for differences
- knowing that all people have feelings, needs, hopes and dreams
- showing forgiveness when someone makes a mistake

It is very important to know that tolerance is not about being passive. When you are tolerant, you do not let others treat you like a door mat. When you are tolerant, you can stand up for yourself and be assertive. You can be tolerant without being mean. You can be assertive without hurting other people's feelings.

Most importantly, God created each of us in a very special way. Each one of us is created in the image and likeness of God. St. John reminds us that love is from God. The Holy Spirit is a part of every one. By celebrating tolerance, we give thanks for God's love and glorify him.

Please join us for mass with the school on November 2 beginning at 9 am in the St. John Brebeuf Church. Also, be sure to check out the virtues bulletin board outside the newly renovated school library. How will you practice tolerance in the month of November?

- Struggle with multiplication? Have trouble with spelling? Work with her teacher to build on her strengths and overcome challenges. Be supportive. Don't do your child's homework for her. But do stay nearby to supervise. It's okay to answer questions and guide your child through problems. But if you feel she needs too much help in an area, talk with her teacher.
